4th Grade

Our fourth graders had the wonderful opportunity to attend Blended Lives last month. This fit perfectly with our focus on Black History month. If you haven't, take some time to ask them about the history of Tallahassee, John G. Riley, and the Goodwood Museum, please do so—they had a wonderful time exploring these two sites. Some also attended our St. Augustine trip, where we continued to learn more about Florida's history focusing on the Spanish conquest along with the British take over of St. Augustine and the many battles that occurred at the fort Castillo de San Marcos.

During this month, we will be taking the time to dive into our students most recent pieces of data from PM 1 testing and PM 2 testing. We will be looking closely at each student and showing them their first scores and comparing it to their second set of scores. We are eager to see gains in these two areas. We have one last PM 3 testing. With great eagerness and importance, we need them to show their very best work and growth.

It has been an adjustment to go from one final end of the year test to 3 tests that take place during the school year. Please remind your student that all 3 tests track their progress and readiness for 5th grade and are very important pieces of data.

In math, we are working on angles, line segments and triangles, next up is units of measurement. Anytime that you can, please allow your child to cook/bake with you in the kitchen to help prepare them for units of measurement.

In reading, we have just completed our Unit 2. We have closed out Unit 2 with a unit test score. We begin Unit 3 which is focusing on Realistic fiction and analyzing characters. We will look closely at how characters develop throughout a story and how we can use inferences to help analyze characters.

5th Grade

We continue to work on rigorous material in the classroom to help prepare our 5th graders for the different FAST and FCAT tests that they will participate in this year.

In Ms. Norman and Mrs. Atkins' classes, the students have been focused on writing with supporting their answers by using text evidence and main ideas. The skill for the reading unit is compare and contrast.

Science continues to make discoveries with Mr. Rwito and the STEM class. We are learning about our environment and its changes in Unit 10.

We can do anything imaginable with fractions! Compare, add, subtract, multiply, divide, or model..... You name it, we can do it! Please look over your child's homework each night and give any extra support needed.

We would also like to ask for our parents to please discuss the importance of BEHAVIOR. When behavior is on task, learning becomes better, and the more fun activities we can do.
