WHO: James S. Rickards High School Students taking Pre-International Baccalaureate English I

WHAT: The following information outlines the assignment we have given to our incoming English I Pre-IB students for the 2023 James S. Rickards Summer Reading Program. This assignment is an addition to the school-wide Summer Reading Program and is intended for students enrolled in the English I Pre-IB course for the 2023-24 school year. This rigorous course, that prepares students for the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (DP), requires students to learn the unique facets of IB such as a holistic view of knowledge, intercultural awareness, and embracing international issues, etc. A requirement of the course is the Florida Standards Assessment administered at the conclusion of the year. This assessment includes writing an informative or argument-based essay. The following assignment will prepare students for what to expect.

Students are expected to complete the assignment by themselves, only using the power of their brain. If a student is caught plagiarizing, they will receive a 0%.

This assignment should be completed via a Word document. Students are encouraged to use their Leon County School's Office365 account, which can be accessed through ClassLink.

WHEN: This assignment will be collected within the first week of class during the 2023-24 school year.

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Assignment: Students will read *Night* by Elie Wiesel. An electronic copy of the memoir can be found here. The book can also be secured on Amazon, Books-A-Million, Barnes & Noble or anywhere books are sold. We also encourage students to use the Leon County Library as a resource to checkout free physical and digital books.

Students will then write a full essay (including a clear introduction and conclusive paragraph) based on the following argument-based prompt. Use evidence from the memoir to support your claims in your body paragraphs. Use the following checklist as a guide:
